2024 Annual Report

Where we've been and where we're headed

Amicalola Electric Membership Corporation (EMC) was established decades ago to bring electricity and convenience to rural areas in North Georgia. By the end of 1941, we had extended power lines to parts of Cherokee, Gilmer and Pickens counties, turning the lights on for 90 consumer-members. Today, we service parts of 10 counties with more than 57,000 meters across a total of 6,215 miles of line.

As Amicalola EMC continues to grow, so does the demand for electricity. To help meet this increasing need, the cooperative is now receiving safe, reliable and emission-free nuclear energy from Plant Vogtle Unit 4—the final unit of the nuclear expansion project near Waynesboro, which became operational in 2024. This project stands among the largest clean energy efforts in the nation, and with Unit 4 now on line, Plant Vogtle has become the single largest generator of clean energy in the United States.

Georgia's strong business environment, skilled workforce and effective leadership continue to fuel economic growth across the state—driving a rising demand for reliable energy. In response, Oglethorpe Power and its 38 member EMCs, including Amicalola EMC, approved the construction of two new natural gas projects in 2024: a two-



unit combined-cycle plant in Monroe County, adjacent to the existing Smart Energy Facility, and a simple-cycle combustion turbine unit in Talbot County. These strategic investments will help meet increasing energy needs while maintaining reliability and affordability. According to the Georgia Public Service Commission's 2024 Winter Rate Survey, Amicalola EMC's rates remain lower than both the state average and those of the local investor-owned utility.

Keeping with the cooperative principles

Electric cooperatives put service ahead of profit. Guided by the seven cooperative principles, we are committed to fairness, dependable service and strengthening our local communities. Amicalola EMC actively invests in education, leadership development, economic growth and sustainability efforts.

In 2024, our board of directors approved capital credits refunds exceeding \$2.6 million to the members who received service in 2003. In accordance with Georgia's unclaimed property laws, more than \$600,000 in unclaimed capital credits were reinvested locally to support education, economic development and nonprofit initiatives. This included \$140,000 in college scholarships for high school students, \$47,381 in Bright Ideas grants for teachers, \$47,000 for local fire departments and contributions to a variety of other eligible projects and organizations.

Our Operation Round Up program donated more than \$89,000 in 2024. All donations were for food, shelter, clothing, health needs, education and specialty needs. Donations were also given to house fire victims within the Amicalola EMC service area.

As a cooperative, Amicalola EMC strongly believes in the power of collaboration. We know that working with local, regional and national partners is key to serving our members effectively.

Hurricane Helene—a devastating Category 4 storm—struck Florida's Big Bend region, bringing deadly storm surges, flooding, tornadoes and high winds. It has since been named the deadliest hurricane since Katrina, with widespread damage across the Southeast. According to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), over 1.25 million electric co-op members lost power, marking one of the most disruptive storms in the history of rural electric cooperatives.

Close to home, we were fortunate to experience only minimal damage. Amicalola EMC quickly restored service locally, then deployed crews to support harder-hit EMCs to the south—highlighting the strength of mutual aid. Whether responding to storms or supporting community projects, we remain dedicated to improving the lives of those we serve.

ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES October 5, 2024

CALL TO ORDER—Chairman Charles R. Fendley, having determined from the registration clerks that a quorum was present, called the Annual Meeting of Members of Amicalola Electric Membership Corporation to order on October 5, 2024. The meeting was held at the headquarters facility in Jasper, Georgia.

INVOCATION—John H. Bennett Jr. gave the invocation.

WELCOME—Chairman Fendley welcomed members and visitors on behalf of the Board of Directors.

BUSINESS SESSION—Attorney Phil M. Landrum III, conducted the meeting.

NOTICE OF MEETING—Attorney Landrum read the meeting notice and proof of mailing of the notice of the 2024 Annual Meeting.

PICKENS/GORDON COUNTIES (Post #4)

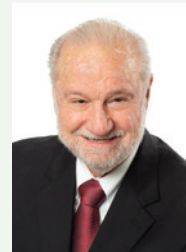

LUMPKIN COUNTY (Post #9)

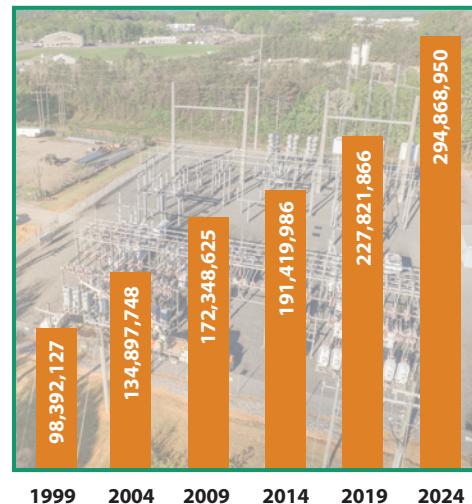

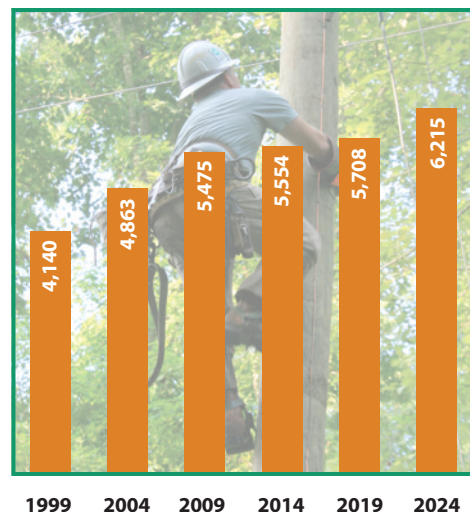

Amicalola EMC will provide special seating arrangements for the hearing impaired and people with disabilities. Members needing

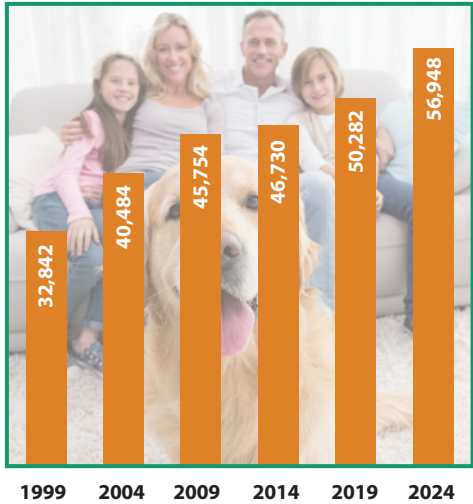
assistance are asked to contact the headquarters office prior to the annual meeting.

PRIZES

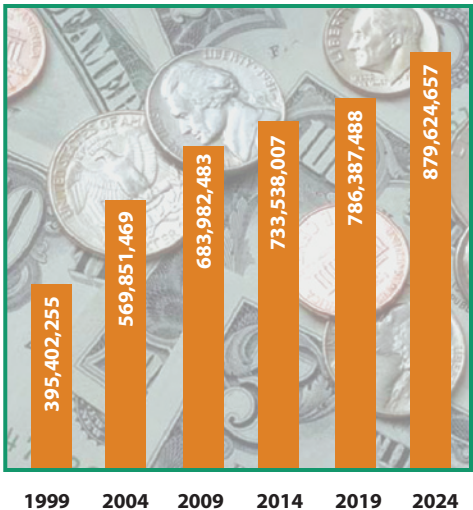
At the time of registration, each voting member will be given a voting member identification sticker and prize stub.

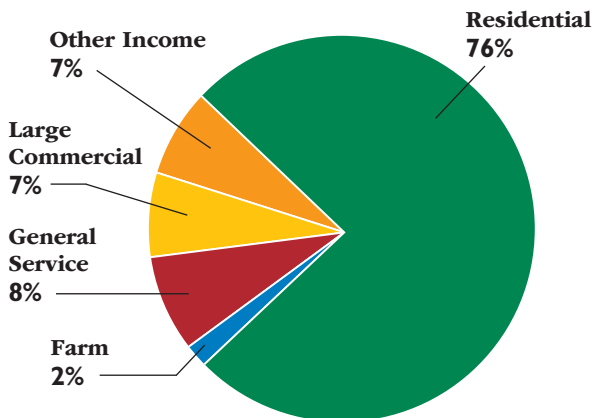
2024 capital credits allocation based on patronage revenue of \$98,934,273

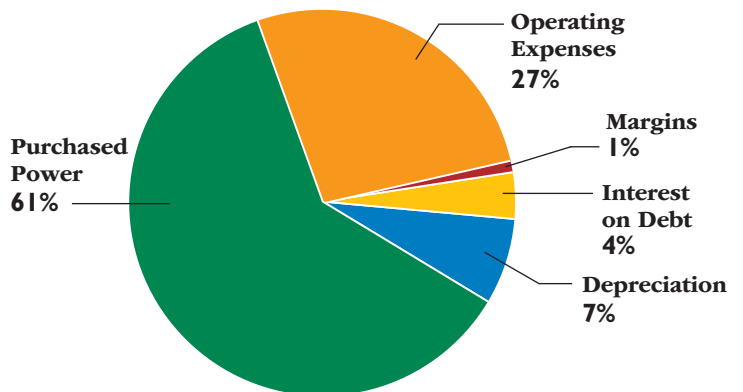

UNFINISHED BUSINESS—There was no unfinished business.

NEW BUSINESS—There was no new business.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT—Attorney Landrum recognized the Nominating Committee members who were present, and then read the report of the committee placing in nomination the following to serve as directors for three-year terms ending at the Annual Meeting 2027: David Pierce, Post 2, Gilmer County and Fannin County; Travis Cline, Post 5, Cherokee County; Reggie Stowers, Post 8, Dawson County and Lumpkin County. There were no nominations by petition, and these directors were re-elected by acclamation.

ELECTION/CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE—Attorney Landrum then introduced the following who had been appointed to serve as the 2024 Election/Credentials Committee: Thorny Mincey, Carl Hill Jr., Billy Edmondson, Charles McClure and Clayton Vaughters.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT—Chairman Fendley thanked the members for attending the Annual Meeting. He reported that Amicalola EMC has consecutively refunded capital credits since 2005, totaling over \$50 million. On September 1, 2024, capital credits totaling over \$2.6 million were refunded to members with accounts in 2003. The cooperative also continues to support youth in our community. In June, Amicalola EMC sponsored four high school students on a trip to Washington, D.C., as part of the Washington Youth Tour. In the fall of 2023, Amicalola EMC was able to fund 74 Bright Ideas grants for teachers to use in their classrooms. Then in March of 2024, college scholarships totaling \$140,000 were awarded to local high school students in our service area. Chairman Fendley closed his remarks by encouraging those in attendance to visit one of the many festivals taking place in our community during this fall season.

CEO'S REPORT—CEO Payne discussed the busy summer which included several storms and the continuation of line improvement projects. The automation project is nearing completion, and this project has saved our members millions of outage minutes in the past two years. Construction has begun on a new substation north of Ellijay in the Lucius Road area, with plans for completion in 2025. In 2026, the Clean Eagle Energy Landfill project is set to be constructed on Old Federal Road. This project will require a new substation and will give some backup feeder lines in the Yellow Creek and Ball Ground areas. CEO Payne discussed the rapid growth in the area. This increased demand will be satisfied, in part, by generation provided by the two new units at Plant Vogtle. Lastly, CEO Payne encouraged everyone to vote in the upcoming election and let your voice be heard.

RECOGNITION OF GUESTS—Chairman Fendley recognized all veterans who were present. Operation Round Up Trustees, retired employees and local elected officials were also recognized. The following guests also attended: Amy Schnieder, GEMC's *Georgia Magazine*, and Robert Fede, GTC.

PRESENTATION OF AWARDS—Chairman Fendley announced the names of service award recipients for 5, 15, 20 and 25 years of service. Johnny Parris was recognized for 30 years of service. Tony Helton was recognized for 35 years of service. Director John H. Bennett Jr. was recognized for 40 years of service.

DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES—Zoe Caldwell drew the tickets for prizes provided by Amicalola EMC.

Being no further business, Chairman Fendley adjourned the meeting.
